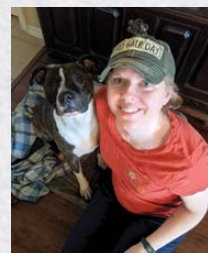


Meet Mariah Acevedo

Meet David Prickett

Publisher for 380News, 380Guide, Pilot Point Guide and Ardmore Guide

David focuses on publishing, distribution, proofing and networking for the publications. His keen eye looks over final proofs before they go to press. Before digitalization of the press was widely available it was not unusual to find David at the printing house at all hours doing press checks with a jewelers loop up to his eye looking at fine details and matching colors to make sure they were coming off the press correctly. Nothing printed until it had his final stamp of approval. His eye for detail gave the startup magazine an expensive and professional look that other small publications were not achieving at the time.

David has also provided several of the covers over the years. He has stood at the top of St. Paul's Cathedral to get a London street view speckled with the tops of red double decker busses. He flew in a helicopter to rural Texas to get directly in front of a lion to capture his expression, resulting in a National Geographic style close up. This photo was taken in order to raise awareness, help rescue and provide a habitat for this kind of the felines.



The original 380Guide website and 380Guide Magazine were the brainchild of David. After moving to Savannah, TX in 2004, while most of Highway 380 was still two lanes he listened to his wife always talk about Savannah and surrounding areas being in an information vacuum. She would leave and go explore while

he was at work and when he came home she would tell him about the unusual little shops she had found. He knew she was suffering burnout in her social work career and suggested that she start a magazine and share all of her finds and experiences. While she laughed at the idea he was serious. He worked with Max Miller, current owner of Cross Timbers Gazette, to help him design a website in 2004. By 2005 the website was wildly successful and local businesses were inquiring about an actual magazine or newspaper. In early 2005 he presented the idea to his wife again and she jumped onboard. "From February to Mid-May of 2005 it was a bit like selling the Emperor's New Clothes. We had a dream but nothing tangible to show the potential clients," said David, "However, our excitement must have been infectious because we rolled out our inaugural June/ July issue with enough contracts to secure us for a year of printing."



David was born in Selma, Alabama and lived in Atlanta, Georgia for a while before his father took a position with American Airlines bringing the family to the Tulsa, Oklahoma area. He grew up in Broken Arrow, a suburb of Tulsa.

David was a culinary rock star in Tulsa, Oklahoma before the Culinary Arts were cool. His first job at fifteen and a half was in the restaurant industry. It was there he learned the basics of French Cuisine. His career over the years moved from the back of the house, to the front of the house, private dining to corporate. His creativity, culinary esthetics, eye for detail and exquisite taste had him booked solid as a private chef for international Tulsa based corporate offices during lunch and elegant weddings on the weekends. While managing The Grill in downtown Tulsa he was awarded the AAA Four Diamond Award. He also won several local awards such as the Taste of Tulsa Silver Spoon Award. In Tulsa, David owned The Green Valley Grill and Avanti's Catering. His passion for food still exists today but prefers to cook for family and friends.



David is a proud father of two sons, Taylor and Julian. He volunteered for years for his son's Boy Scout Troops. He is an active member of area Chambers and Networking Groups. In his off time he enjoys dining at local eateries, relaxing and having adventures in the outdoors, restoring old buildings and traveling the world with his family.

"THE SQUARE"

Pilot Point is the oldest town in Denton County. Pioneers began settling the area in the late 1840's. The public square of the town was platted and laid out by George Newcome on Christmas Day in 1853. The Pilot Point Historic Square was originally known as "Pilot's Point" which designated a high point of timber that served as a landmark for travelers. Pilot Point was also near an early immigrant trail and was a frequent stop on the Butterfield Stage route. Pilot Point Historic Square WALKING TOUR

1. The John Hundley Building:

The building, originally built in 1872, was commissioned by John Merchant and built by John Hundley. It is the oldest brick building in Denton County. Currently it is The Purple Door Day Spa. Originally, it was home to a general store and the second floor was used frequently as a lodge hall.



2. F.A. Wright Dry Goods and Leather:

Currently vacant. This building was built sometime in the 1870's and once housed F.A. Wright Dry Goods, Grocery and Leather. Later, with the advancement of electricity, it was home to the Power and Light Company. Around the same time, the local telephone operator was on the second floor and was expected to locate wayward citizens she could spot on the Town Square. The building facade went from Victorian to Nouveau-Deco in the 1920's.



3. Star Drug Store:

Currently Pilot Point Coffee House. This building was originally built for J.W. Eddleman by John Hundley in 1873, and housed Star Drug Store. Later it was used by J.C. Selman and Son Groceries. This building has burned down and been rebuilt four times.



4. O.A. Ross and Son Dry Goods: Newly renovated in 2018, this 1870's building has been home to Pelzel's Barber Shop and Salon since the 1960's. Originally, the ground floor was home to O.A. Ross and Son Dry Goods while the second floor was used as a flop house. Later, Mrs. Copenhaver sold sewing notions at this location.



5. Greenberg Perlman Building:

Currently the building houses the Justice Art Studio. The Greenberg Perlman Building c.1885 sold silver, antiques and finery.



6. Saddlery and Saloon:

Constructed in 1885, this building served as a saddlery and saloon until 1907. During the 1920's and 1930's, it housed the Notorious Cafe and Domino Hall. In 2012, with a wink and a nod, Notoriously Yours Boutique moved in.



7. Old Barber Shop: Currently vacant, this building was constructed in 1896 and was home to a Barber Shop. During the 1920's it was turned into a small cafe and it is rumored to have been frequented by the notorious duo, Bonnie and Clyde during the early 1930's.



8. Hardware and Harness Business:

Built in 1896, this vacant building was home to a hardware and harness business, but that did not last long. From 1896, until the early 1900's, Grays Furniture and Undertaking served the community from this building. In the 1930's, it became home to a dance hall and later the building became Stephens' Grocery.



9. City Hall and Pilot Point

Police Department: Built in 1892, this building served as the Pilot Point National Bank until the mid - 1960's and remains the scene of the only unsolved bank robbery in Pilot Point which occurred in 1932. Donated to the City of Pilot Point, it was renovated in 2003 and became home of Pilot Point's City Government and Police Station.



10. Midway Saloon: Built as a wood structure in the early to mid - 1880's, this building was rebuilt with brick in the early 1890's and housed one of Pilot Point's most notorious saloon and billiard halls, known as the Midway Saloon. In 1904, the last gunfight in Pilot Point broke out in front of the saloon, and to this day you can still find bullet holes in the front facade of the building. After being vacant for many years, Martin General Store moved in in 2018 with a nod to Dry Goods stores from era's past.



11 and 12. Chandler and Company: Built in the early to mid-1880's in wood and then later rebuilt in brick, this building was originally home to Chandler and Co. believed to be a wagon and buggy company. In the mid twentieth century, The building was partitioned and Selz and Henzler Insurance moved in and has been serving the community ever since.



13. The Mississippi Store:

The current antiques section was originally the Mississippi Store in 1876 and then served as Doc Amos' Drug Store from the mid - 1930's until the 1940's. It was popular with the local youth of the day because it had an old time soda fountain. Some say you can still smell Doc's cigar. Currently Ab and Gail's Antiques.



14. The Gaslight Building: Currently Square Center is now the home of a lawnmower repair and parts store. In c. 1876 it was originally G.W. Davidsons and Co. Dry Goods and Clothiers.



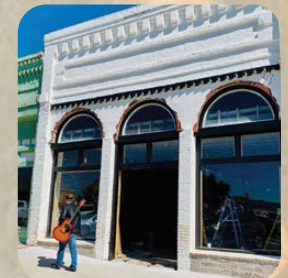
15. Almond's Cash Grocery Store: Currently vacant. This building was built in 1882. It housed Almond's Cash and Grocery and then later Stephens Grocery in the mid - 20th century until they moved to the north side of the Square.



16. Flakes and Floppin Hardware and Stoves: Recently renovated but currently vacant. This building housed Flakes and Floppin Hardware and Stoves in 1882.



17. Nunn and McFarland Clothing and Furnishing: Currently vacant, this building was originally Nunn and McFarland Clothing and Furnishing Goods in 1884.



18. N. Wilson and Company Dry Goods and Clothing: Now Dolly's Antiques, it was originally known as Wilson and Co. Dry Goods and Clothing in 1884.

19. Pilot Point Museum:

Originally built in the early 1880's, this building housed R.M. Baird and Co Dry Goods and Notions until it was renovated in the late 1890's into The City Hotel and later became the Cloer Hotel. Sometime in the mid -20th century, the second floor was removed.



20. Golden Triangle Meat Processing:

Currently Pilot Point Meat Processing. Originally built in c. 1890.



21. South Side:

This portion of the Historic Square was damaged in a tornado during the 1950's and later destroyed by fire. It was decided to tear down what remained of the buildings and the property has sat vacant for many years.



22. Ruby and Pearl Hotel:

Also known as the Holt Building, it was built in the 1890's as a hotel. It was purchased in 2017 and renamed the Ruby and Pearl Hotel. Renovations are currently underway.



23. Lowbrows:

Built in 1893, this building was originally Dad Robin's Place, a restaurant. It was later home to the Pilot Point Post Signal, established earlier in 1878 and Denton County's oldest newspaper. They called this building home from about 1900 to 1960. It is interesting to note that this building is one of the few buildings on The Square that still have the original front doors and windows.



Converted into Lowbrows, a Bar and Music Venue in the mid 2000's by Bob Albrecht. Currently closed. Reopening soon as Lowbrows Saloon.

24. Old City Jail:

Built prior to 1880, the Old City Jail was built of native stone, like the town's earliest masonry structures and now shares the lot belonging to Lowbrows. It is also the site of the hanging of notorious outlaw Spoon Butler during the Civil War.



25. Pilot Point Opera House:

The building was originally R.T. Evans Hardware. The original Opera House was built above the hardware store in 1894 and named the Queen Theater providing a 300 seat opera house. The property also was home to a livery stable, and various boot, saddle and harness shops where the current theater resides. AFG Travel Agency now exists in the building that housed the original theater, which was removed. The Garage Door Theater is still offering regular performances on the other side.



26. Farm and Merchants Bank:

Built in 1896, the Farmers and Merchants Bank, with its Richardsonian Romanesque architecture, is a focal point of The Square. It closed during the depression and never reopened as a bank. Contrary to some local myths, Bonnie and Clyde never robbed this bank. It was, however, used as a set for the 1967 Bonnie and Clyde movie starring Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway, as well as being the annual backdrop to Pilot Point's Bonnie and Clyde Days recreation of a robbery scene in the movie.

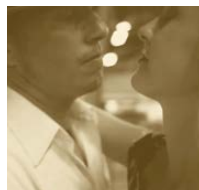

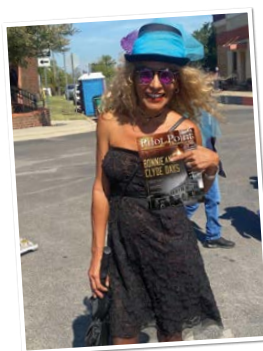
