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


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

New Budget Proposal

Earmarks Funds for Mental Health, Roads, Courts and Law Enforcement

DENTON COUNTY, TX – Denton County's Fiscal Year 2021-2022 proposed budget earmarks an estimated \$12 million for public and mental health, road maintenance and improvements, new district and probate courts, cybersecurity measures, law enforcement and emergency preparedness among other elements to meet the challenges of a growing

population, an ongoing pandemic and to build continuity of services to the public.

"We designed this budget with the public in mind," said Denton County Judge Andy Eads. "We believe it is important to focus on roads, mental health and our law enforcement and judicial system while at the same time ensuring continuity of services to the public by supporting employees. During this past year, all of us have faced many challenges but as our population nears the 1 million mark, we must look forward to prepare for the future," he said.

Acrylicize Studio Selected for New Frisco Library Public Art Project



FRISCO, TX – Community-inspired artwork will enhance the experience for anyone visiting the 'reimagined' Frisco Public Library, when it opens in its new space in fall 2022. Acrylicize will design 330 linear feet of

guardrail for the lobby and social stairs and create the lobby ceiling installation. The Frisco Public Art Board selected the Seattle-based studio from a nationwide pool of nearly 200 artists.

"174 artists from throughout the United States responded to this project – the most ever for a City of Frisco Call to Artists," said Robert Moroch, Chairman of the Public Art Board. "Acrylicize emerged as the clear choice

because of their ability to provide enduring artworks that represent the character of a community." In accordance with the public art "percent for art" ordinance, this project for the new library is funded from the \$62 million bond approved for the library building project and the contract was approved by Frisco City Council.

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

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An Easy Weekend Getaway

Any Night is a Good Night at the Liberty Hotel

CLEBURNE, TX- Not too many years ago, Cleburne, TX was just short of becoming a ghost town. It was not until recently the town started a revitalization effort breathing a fresh energy into the once quiet downtown. I went to Cleburne to stay at the historic Liberty Hotel and visit a dear friend who is the current caregiver of this historic beauty! Her eyes sparkled as she shared stories of the Liberty Hotel, The Dudley's and Historic Downtown Cleburne. The building was constructed in 1924. With time, the building was in disrepair and needed a miracle. Long-time Cleburne resident Howard and Sherry Dudley came to the rescue. Howard, who made his fortune from his inventions, decided to take on the challenge of purchasing and rescuing the beautiful and elegant building that was all but forgotten. Spending far more money than it would have cost to demolish the building and start anew, it didn't matter. His heart was in the preservation of his beloved Cleburne.

Thankfully, there are people like the Dudley's that love old buildings and realize that new isn't always better. The Liberty Hotel is now part of the Ascend Hotel Collection, and it is located at 205 South Caddo Street smack in the middle of downtown Cleburne.

One of my favorite weekend getaways is one where I can park my car and not really have to get in it again until it is time to go home. The Liberty Hotel offers just that luxury. There are about 12 restaurants within walking distance and about eight nearby attractions easily accessible by foot. In addition, there are lots of stores and antiques to be done. You won't want to miss Heritage Home Inspired, Miss Minnie's Mercantile or the Bus Depot where you can find one of just about anything. We wanted to visit the museums, art galleries, and murals but we were only there for a weekend.

We enjoyed a delicious meal at R & K Café with obscenely

large portions. It was so yummy it presented more of a challenge to try to finish every last delectable bite. Then, almost as an encore they deliver a complimentary dish of banana pudding. Good thing it was within walking distance of the hotel because we absolutely needed it after overindulging. We also enjoyed a tasty brunch at Chaf In Restaurant, also just a short walk from the hotel. It is a fun train themed restaurant with murals painted on the outside of the building and a miniature train that runs around the entire space just below the ceiling.

On Saturday we ventured off to the Bluegrass on the Trail Festival held at the fascinating historic Chisolm Trail Outdoor Museum located at 101 Chisolm Trail. Just a short drive away but well worth it. The festival was filled with music, vendors and exhibits. This event happens every spring so plan on attending mid-May of next year. Besides enjoying the museum, we watched some blacksmiths create some interesting and exquisite ironwork, we tapped our toes to some delightful music and ate some very tasty food.

I was also excited to find some folk-art stuffed animals we found at a very reasonable price. There were dozens of vendors with many selling handmade items. We found out that the floors in the original Wardville jail and the School House had come from the Liberty Hotel's restoration. Horseback Riding will be on our list next time.

Just in case we did not have our fill of music, we ventured over to Song Bird Live after we returned from the Blue Grass Festival. It is just a short walk from the hotel, located at 210 East Henderson Street. I cannot speak highly enough of this little intimate venue that really packs a punch with their music lineup. It's a smoke free venue with refreshments at intermission and

BYOB is welcome. The tickets are affordable and the talented professional musicians pack houses in the DFW area and beyond. Tom and Marcia Burkett, the proprietors, followed their passion in making their dream come true with this great addition to downtown Cleburne.

After the spectacular performance at Song Bird Live we walked across the street for a late hour gallery opening at Red Horse Art Gallery, located at 209 East Henderson Street. They were friendly and down to earth but with a surprising collection of original artworks, limited editions and artist proofs. What a lovely way to round off a day.

Trovato Street, located at 106 East Henderson Street, Suite A, may have been the highlight of our Sunday. We walked around the block from the hotel to find a candy extravaganza. This beautifully renovated building is stuffed full of nostalgic candy with free samples of saltwater taffy that will satisfy any sweet tooth. The candy is sold by the pound but it is very reasonably priced for the experience. Trovato Street also offers a high-end chocolate from St. Louis sold by the bar or the piece.

The candy boutique also has a root beer bar you can belly up to. It is designed a bit like a high-end saloon but its main draw is root beer, for all ages of course! They have over 50 flavors of ice-cold root beers to try. Ice cream is available, of course, on the side or in a float.

We also had a quick visit to a fun and interactive toy store, Central Station Toys, located at 209 South Main Street. They had collectable vintage toys, unique and hard to find toys and an event room with tabletop gaming, and game nights for everyone to attend. It truly gave a sense of community.

While we did not experience everything, downtown Cleburne had to offer, we absolutely kept our dance card full. It was a surprisingly fun, up-and-coming area that we are excited to revisit.

While any night is a good night to stay at the Liberty Hotel, a much-needed fun weekend is the best!

What People Should and Should Not Do if They Get Mail from the IRS

WASHINGTON, D.C.— Every year the IRS mails letters or notices to taxpayers for many different reasons. Typically, it's about a specific issue with a taxpayer's federal tax return or tax account. A notice may tell them about changes to their account or ask for more information. It could also tell them they need to make a payment. This year, people might have also received correspondence about Economic Impact Payments or an advance child tax credit outreach letter.

Here are some do's and don'ts for anyone who receives mail from the IRS:

Don't ignore it. Most IRS letters and notices are about federal tax returns or tax accounts. Each notice deals with a specific issue and includes specific instructions on what to do

Don't throw it away. Tax-

payers should keep notices or letters they receive from the IRS. These include adjustment notices when an action is taken on the taxpayer's account, Economic Impact Payment notices, and letters about advance payments of the 2021 child tax credit. They may need to refer to these when filing their 2021 tax return in 2022. In general, the IRS suggests that taxpayers keep records for three years from the date they filed the tax return.

Don't panic. The IRS and its authorized private collection agencies do send letters by mail. Most of the time, all the taxpayer needs to do is read the letter carefully and take the appropriate action.

Don't reply unless instructed to do so. There is usually no need for a taxpayer to reply to a notice unless spe-

cifically instructed to do so. On the other hand, taxpayers who owe should reply with a payment. IRS.gov has information about payment options.

Do take timely action. A notice may reference changes to a taxpayer's account, taxes owed, a payment request or a specific issue on a tax return. Acting timely could minimize additional interest and penalty charges.

Do review the information. If a letter is about a changed or corrected tax return, the taxpayer should review the information and compare it with the original return. If the taxpayer agrees, they should make notes about the corrections on their personal copy of the tax return and keep it for their records.

Do respond to a disputed notice. If a taxpayer doesn't agree with the IRS, they should

mail a letter explaining why they dispute the notice. They should mail it to the address on the contact stub included with the notice. The taxpayer should include information and documents for the IRS to review when considering the dispute.

Do remember there is usually no need to call the IRS. If a taxpayer must contact the IRS by phone, they should use the number in the upper right-hand corner of the notice. The taxpayer should have a copy of their tax return and letter when calling the agency.

Do avoid scams. The IRS will never contact a taxpayer using social media or text message. The first contact from the IRS usually comes in the mail. Taxpayers who are unsure if they owe money to the IRS can view their tax account information on IRS.gov.

The focus on these areas are a key part of the proposed \$336,907,503 budget under consideration by the Denton County Commissioners Court.

Other key factors in the FY 2021-2022 budget include:

- Increasing the road project planning in the Permanent Improvement Fund by \$2 million, doubling the amount to pay for roads.

- Sliding the pay scale for employees by 3 percent for a total of \$3.86 million to help ensure starting salaries do not fall behind the market more than they are currently. This initiative will also help promote available county positions in the market.

- Providing a 3 percent cost of living adjustment at \$3.45 million to help employees move through pay ranges to exceed rates a new employee would receive over time. Denton County employees did not receive raises in the FY 2020-2021 budget year.

- Allotting \$2.07 million for new hire salary and benefits. Of 86.6 positions requested by county departments, only 60.1 positions were included in the proposed budget. Taking into account four deleted positions, the net number of

positions included in the proposed budget is 56.1. Denton County continues to decline in the number of employees per 1,000 residents, falling from a high of 2.33 employees per 1,000 residents in 2014 to the current rate of 2.02 employees per the same number of residents. In 2021, the rate was 2.07 employees per capita. Denton County has the third lowest employee per capita rate out of the top 15 counties by population.

“We continue to consider “out of the box” ideas for increasing services to you while maintaining a conservative view on new positions,” Judge Eads said. “We have reorganized several departments, eliminating some positions while creating new positions better targeted to delivering what the public needs.”

The county will reclassify a number of positions in law enforcement to better retain existing talent and experience in a highly competitive market, officials said. An additional eight positions will be added with 271 positions being reclassified. In addition, a new Human Trafficking Unit will be created to target a growing issue in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. The estimated

cost will be \$3.8 million for the recommended changes.

“I appreciate your consideration on giving them what they're worth,” said Denton County Sheriff Tracy Murphree, referring to his law enforcement team. “With this proposed budget, it will help me with retention,” he said. “And this will help us give people the quality law enforcement they deserve.”

Precinct 1 Commissioner Ryan Williams, who has a background in law enforcement, said he agreed with supporting law enforcement and advocated for the additional Human Trafficking Unit.

For road maintenance and improvements, \$2 million is set aside for road projects, an estimated \$1 million will be spent on capital equipment for roads, and \$852,250 is projected for surface treatment, flex base, lumber, fencing, culvert repairs and more.

In January, Denton County also will open two additional courts in FY 2021-2022 including the 481st District Court and the Probate Court 2. Total costs for both courts are estimated at \$1.2 million. The courts will handle increased demand as county growth escalates.

In the area of public and mental health, the proposed budget includes approximately \$1 million for additional staffing including a Disease Intervention Specialist, Registered Nurse and three Assistant Program Coordinators. A new mental health services program to help post-partum depression patients who are eligible for the Family Planning Grant resources is included along with increased funding for public health and MHMR.

Growth has increased the demand for services under Emergency Preparedness, necessitating the need for five new positions at \$581,282, an estimated \$280,700 for additional fire calls and \$75,000 for countywide ambulance services.

Revenues can fluctuate from year to year and Denton County experienced increased fluctuations in 2020. For example, interest earnings received in 2020 totaled \$2.2 million. For the FY 2021-2022 budget, interest earnings are estimated at \$169,400.

The county's main source of revenue is from property taxes, which is different from municipalities, which also receive sales tax revenues.

The proposed tax rate of

\$0.233086 still falls well below all but one of the top 15 most populated Texas counties in terms of the county tax rate. Denton County, with an estimated population of 933,220, ranks the second lowest in the county tax rate category and is the lowest in the county-wide rate. County-wide rates include additional tax rates for such districts as hospitals, community college, and flood control and port authority – none of which exist in Denton County.

“We are committed to ensuring the best use of taxpayer money,” Precinct 3 Commissioner Bobbie J. Mitchell said. As the longest serving member of the Court, Commissioner Mitchell and her fellow Court members continue to seek cost saving measures to keep tax rates as low as possible.

According to the Texas Comptroller's website, Denton County's tax rate in FY 2021 was the sixth lowest among 254 counties. Four of the remaining five counties had significantly less population, ranging from Midland County with a tax rate of \$0.128844 to Reagan County with a tax rate of \$0.220020.

For example, using the proposed tax rate of \$0.233086 and the average 2021 Denton County home value of \$359,651, a resident living in the City of Denton would owe 10 percent of their overall annual property taxes to Denton County. The Denton Independent School District tax rate accounts for 64 percent, while the City of Denton tax rate accounts for 26 percent of the annual amount paid by property owners.

The average Denton County homeowner would see an increase of \$29.14 for the county portion of the annual property taxes, which is the difference between this year's tax rate and next year's proposed tax rate using the 2021 average home value for both tax rates.

Denton County Commissioners approved the recommended changes to the proposed budget on Tuesday after hearing five appeals from various departments. The Court will hold a public hearing on the proposed tax rate at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 14. The Court will hold a public hearing at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 21, with a final vote on both the proposed tax rate and the proposed budget on that date.

Bonnie and Clyde Return to Pilot Point

PILOT POINT, TX- Every year, infamous outlaws Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow ride again in North Texas.

While the actual Bonnie & Clyde died in a hail of gunfire in rural Louisiana in the 1930s, Pilot Point comes together every year to commemorate the filming of the classic film starring Faye Dunaway and Warren Beatty. "Bonnie & Clyde", shot in 1966 in various locations around north Texas, filmed its famous bank robbery scene in the Farmers and Merchants Bank on the corner of Washington and Main.

THE FILMING

This year's Bonnie & Clyde Days Festival, which recognizes the Academy Award-winning film shot right in the Historic Pilot Point Square, will be on October 9. This year, the festival will have extended hours, with activities for families, vendor booths, live music and the famed reenactments going all day from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Dunaway and Beatty were the leads in a star-studded cast that descended upon north Texas in the fall of 1966 for the filming of the movie, which also included appearances by Gene Hackman, Estelle Parsons (who won an Oscar for her portrayal of Blanche Barrow) and Gene Wilder. Frequently, director Arthur Penn would cast locals to play the extras. That's how Purple Door Salon owner Bobbie Jezek found herself in the film as one of the children. Other local extras, according to news reports, included relatives of Mayor George Hilz (his 11-year-old daughter Karen Hilz and nephew 14-year-old Michael Hilz), and Mrs. Harold Smith (wife of then Chamber of Commerce President). North Texas State University's custodian Dee Ray Jones was hired as an extra in the bank robbery scene because his haircut matched the 1930's style. He can be seen walking from the rear of the bank, looking through the bank teller's window, and raising his hands.

"Bonnie & Clyde", while receiving mixed reviews, was one of the top 5 grossing films of 1967, earning \$70 million worldwide at the box office.

LOCAL CONNECTIONS

An oft-repeated legend is that Bonnie & Clyde were frequently spotted in the Pilot Point area, but not to rob any

banks. Clyde Barrow had relatives in the area, who would offer safe haven to the Barrow Gang between their robberies.

Newspaper reports show that Clyde Barrow was briefly incarcerated in the Denton jail in 1930 in connection with the burglary of the Motor Mark Garage. Barrow was transferred to the McLennan County jail in Waco, where Barrow accomplices Turner and Abernathy were being held after sentencing, and the trio escaped after Bonnie allegedly smuggled weapons into the jail.

2021 BONNIE & CLYDE FESTIVAL

This year's Bonnie & Clyde Days will bring back the festival everyone knows and loves, while also taking it to the next level.

Festival attendees can expect the reenactment of the bank robbery scene, red dirt country music, a free kids' zone, classic car show, including a stellar fleet of Model A's, the Pie-Eating Contest sponsored by Moms on Main and antique tractors.

Headlining the slate of music for this year's festival will be Mike & the Moonpies. Their set will begin at 6 pm on the main stage. They will cap off a day filled with live entertainment, everything from dance troupes and tumbling to other live music groups, featuring Deanie Deal and Brian "Beerman" Houser.

But this year, it is extra special for the City of Pilot Point Staff, as Pilot Point was named a Film Friendly Community by the Texas Film Commission earlier this year.

"Bonnie & Clyde" is a huge part of Pilot Point's inclusion as "Film Friendly" within the state of Texas. The Texas Film Commission, a part of the Office of the Texas Governor, announced Pilot Point's inclusion earlier this year. Pilot Point joins a distinguished crowd of more than 150 other cities statewide. To become a Film Friendly Community, the list of requirements includes attending a series of workshops and creating Film

Guidelines, which must be adopted as an ordinance by City Council.

"Pilot Point is excited to make our Film Friendly certification official! Film crews took over the streets of Pilot Point in 1967 during the filming of 'Bonnie & Clyde' and the city now celebrates 'the day Hollywood came to town' with an annual Bonnie and Clyde Days festival," said Denise Morris, Executive Director, Pilot Point Municipal Development District.

While other locations around the area have ties to the film as well – the southwest film premiere was at the Campus Theatre in Denton, as well as scenes shot in Garland, Midlothian, Waxahachie and Ponder – Pilot Point is proud to welcome everybody back to a glimpse back in time every fall.

Celina Police Arrest Burglary Ring and Recover \$20,000 in Stolen Property

CELINA, TX – On August 17th, the Celina Police Department executed a Search and Arrest Warrant in the 2000 block of Maxwell Court in Aubrey, Texas. The warrant was issued in response to a call regarding the burglary of a building on the 900 block of West Frontier Parkway on 8/7/2021. During the burglary investigation, patrol officers discovered over \$20,000 of property belonging to the victim was stolen from a storage unit. Further research showed that an

employee of the storage unit and their family members were responsible for the burglary. Additionally, the Celina Criminal Investigative Division and Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) learned one of the suspects was selling the stolen items on social media. The CRU Section was able to purchase one of the stolen items from the suspect. Three suspects were arrested on scene, and the third will be apprehended at a later date. The Criminal Investigative Division and Crime Reduction Unit recovered all the stolen property taken

from the storage unit.

"I want residents of Celina to feel safe and for their property to be protected," said Celina Police Chief John Cullison. "Our fine officers and investigators quickly responded to a call and were able to find the stolen property, make the arrests, and prevent these bad actors from future criminal activity in our community."

The man of the year award honors recipients that provide exceptional service to Agrilife Extension and have a positive impact on agriculture in Texas. During his near fifty years on the committee, Dennis has sponsored countless educational programs for producers and donated supplies for many 4-H projects, scholarship recipients, and in-school gardening programs. He stays in constant contact

with the office, often fielding questions from citizens that need help. He provides the office with an outside voice to identify issues that the public needs to know about.

Renderings of the final designs will be released once approved by the Public Art Board.

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




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
